This year's Workers Memorial Day (April 28) begins our national campaign to demand postal management finally address the unsafe and toxic workplaces that our members face.

We are demanding national action that has a real impact at the local level.

National Postal Service management must stop turning a blind eye to hostile managers. Too often, the Postal Service moves hostile managers from one facility to the next, shifting the problem, rather than solving it.

It's time to hire. While we've made progress in some areas, there are vast areas of postal employment that are still severely understaffed. Understaffing creates a pressure cooker environment that only makes hostile work environments worse.

Management must change the culture. As well as taking action against bad managers, the Postal Service must work to create a culture of co-operation with workers through our unions, instead of confrontation. Postal workers deserve dignity and respect.
