Employee safety paramount following suspicious letter report

The Postal Service has been made aware of two suspicious letters postmarked yesterday in Spokane. Both are being analyzed and tested for hazardous material.

One letter was addressed to the Spokane Post Office. The second letter was addressed to a federal judge in Spokane. Both contained material that preliminary lab testing confirmed for the presence of ricin.

Further analysis is now being conducted in specially-equipped public health laboratories. We will update you when results of these tests are available.

We have no reason to believe that any employees are at risk from handling the suspect letters as they passed through the mailstream in Spokane. The substance involved was not in a form that could be inhaled or otherwise readily ingested.

If anyone were to inhale a quantity of ricin large enough to produce symptoms, they most likely would include fever, cough, and difficulty breathing and would appear within 24 hours. If you have not experienced such symptoms, you should not be concerned. If you have, we urge you to let your supervisor know and see your doctor promptly for an evaluation.

Doctors treat the symptoms similar to how they treat the flu — bed rest, management of the fever and other assistance if needed. Like other medical issues, the sooner treatment begins, the better the results.

The two letters also contained physical threats, which have been fully investigated by the Postal Inspection Service and the Federal Protective Service. There were no suspicious items or activities identified.

In light of these events, we urge everyone to stay vigilant and remember our PACKAGE, PEOPLE, PLAN suspicious mail message:

- PACKAGE: Don't handle suspicious mail. Isolate it.
- PEOPLE: Clear people from the area. Immediately notify your supervisor.
- PLAN: Contact the Inspection Service. Follow our facility emergency plan.
