

Dear Mr. Wilson:

On several occasions, we met to discuss the above-captioned grievance at the fourth step of our contractual grievance procedure.

The matters presented by you as well as the applicable contractual provisions have been reviewed and given careful consideration.

The issue in this grievance is whether the grievant was properly instructed to remove a button with the inscription "CFC NO."

The facts in our respective files indicate that the grievant is a clerk involved in mail processing operations out of the sight of the general public. On the date in question, he was instructed not to wear a metal button with the inscription "CFC NO" while on the workroom floor.

It is our mutual understanding that the wearing of the disputed button under the circumstances present in this case does not violate any existing rules or regulations.

Based upon the above understanding, we mutually agreed to consider the case closed.
